

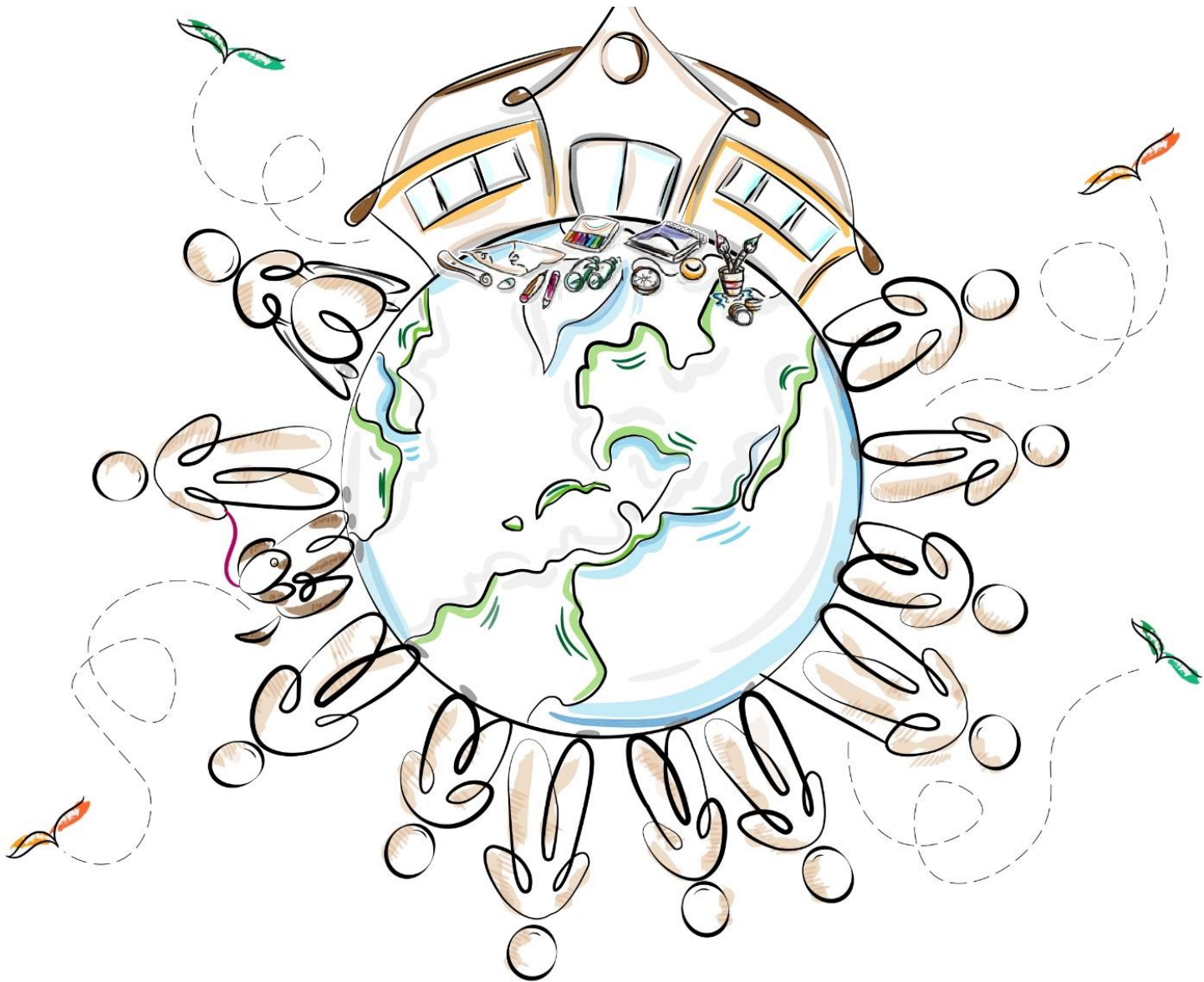

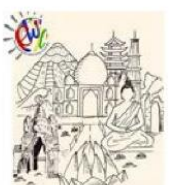

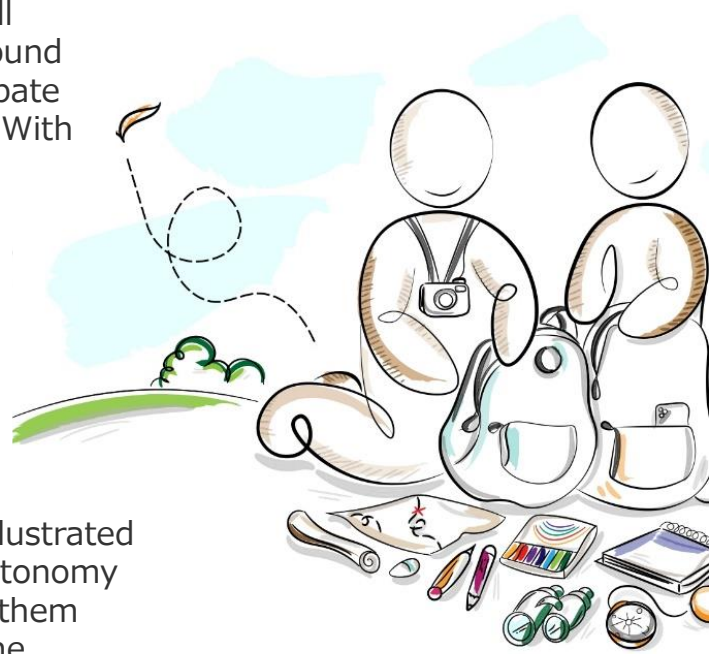

Why this guide?

This guide has been developed so that all children and young people in schools around the world, without exclusion, can participate in the pedagogical project Reconnecting With Your Culture.

It has been created so that children and adolescents, their teachers, grandmothers, grandfathers, other relatives, and the local community, know the steps to follow of the international pedagogical method.

The guide has been written using Clear Language (clairvoyance) and has been illustrated to facilitate its understanding and the autonomy of people with disabilities, thus allowing them access and meaningful participation in the application of the pedagogical method.



What is the international pedagogical method - Reconnecting With Your Culture?

It is an educational method created by the International Research Centre Esempli di Architettura and the UNESCO Forum Chair University and Cultural Heritage.

Reconnecting With Your Culture is aimed at primary and secondary schools around the world.

The pedagogical method is an orderly process in which children and adolescents with the help of their teachers, mothers, fathers, and representatives search for some cultural heritage, draw it, and tell their experiences.

What is the purpose of the pedagogical method - Reconnecting With Your Culture?

Its objective is to bring young generations closer to the values and content of their CULTURE. Strengthen local identity as well as knowledge and protection of its cultural heritage.



What is Cultural Heritage?



It is a set of constructions, objects, manifestations, or activities of great significance, historical and cultural value, virtues and manifestations, and continuity of representations for a society. This heritage expresses the cultural identity of a people or society or region.

Cultural heritage is classified into tangible heritage, intangible heritage, & transitory heritage.

(i) Tangible heritage is objects, constructions, and buildings of historical, artistic, and cultural value. They are a testimony of an existing or already disappeared society or civilization. They can be buildings, churches, castles, archaeological ruins, sculptures, paintings, tools, books, documents, and old photographs.

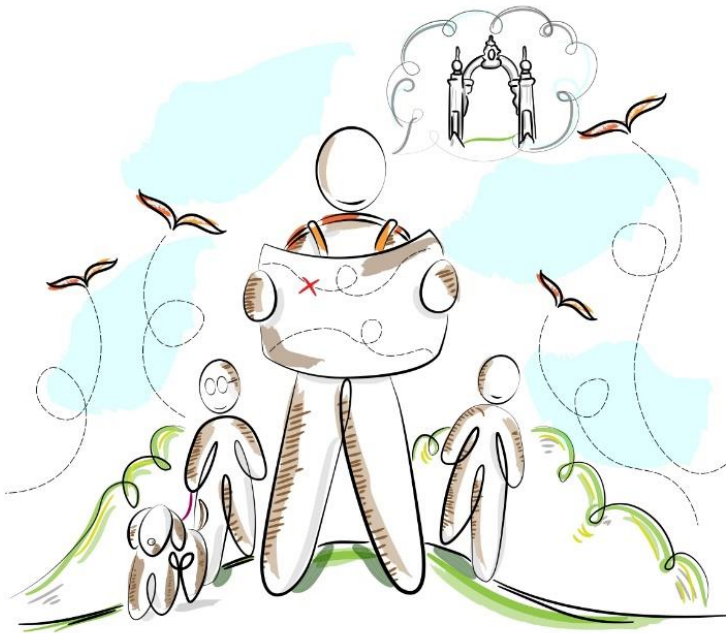
(ii) Intangible heritage is the expressions, knowledges, and activities that identify a CULTURE; these include festivals, pilgrimages, rituals, dances, legends, songs, music, and typical foods.

(iii) Transitory heritage is a bridge and link between the two cited poles, representing fixed natural sites and their associated ritualsapes and festivities; these are more common in the ancient sacred cities, e.g., in the Oriental Cultural Realm.



Who can participate?

Primary and secondary schools around the world. Students from these schools should be between 5 and 17 years old. Participation is FREE.



How can I participate?

You must prepare yourself as if you were going on a trip to find a treasure and then draw it.

Method Steps Reconnecting With Your Culture

The Reconnecting With Your Culture method is based on these three steps:

1



A trip through your city, sacred/holy places – the heritage treasure awakening!

2



Draw your heritage treasure – sketches, photographs, poem, some narratives.

3



Tell us about your experience – short essay, dialogues, and co-sharing

Here's how each step is done.

What should I do?

You must imagine that you are going to make an expedition, an adventure to find a treasure and an inherent message of awe and wonder. The treasure will be some cultural heritage of your community.

Ask your teachers, relatives, or friends for help in selecting the route or place where you will make your expedition.

First Step. Preparations for the Heritage Treasure Awakening

Where to go and why?

Choose a place to visit, get to know, and discover some heritage near you.

Ask your teachers, relatives, or friends for help in selecting the route or place where you will make your expedition.

Ask the person who helps you to tell you why this place can be important to get a heritage treasure.

The place can be your school, your neighbourhood or community, the square, a park, the centre of your city, a museum, or even a temple or church.

Any place that is comfortable, easy, and safe to travel for you and the people who accompany you under the biosecurity measures for COVID-19.

Wear your mask at all times and maintain a social distance of 1.5 metres!

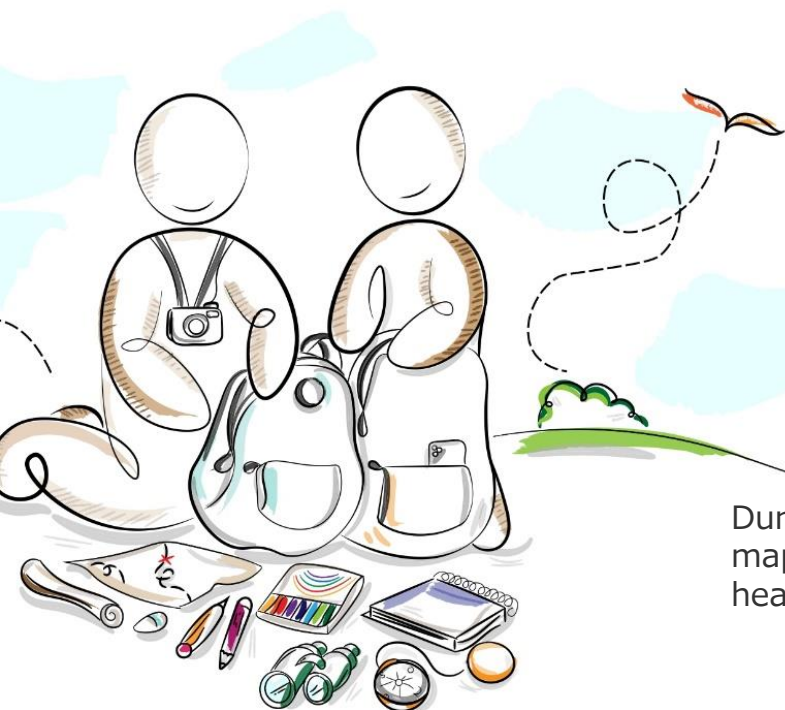
This will be a team expedition!



What should you take with you?

When you have identified your destiny, arm your backpack, backpack, or bag for the trip. Carry everything you think you may need for your expedition:

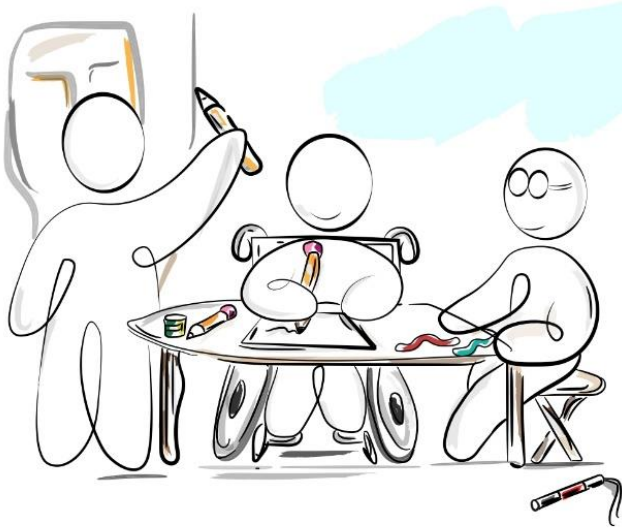
- Drawing materials, map or map of the place, camera or cell phone, notebook, recorder.
- Hydration or water bottle and if necessary, also something to eat.
- Biosecurity kit.



During the tour, you must write, draw a map, and sketch out what you observe, hear, and feel.

Second step. Draw your heritage treasure



Make your tour, if possible, in a pedestrian way.

Draw a map/sketch of your route.
Describe the important things you see, hear, or feel.

You can also write down facts about the history, mythology, people, and place where you are.

These will be the clues so that people can know your route and know how to get to your heritage treasure.

Once you reach your destination, draw/write about your heritage treasure.

Draw your great treasure!

You can make your drawing with the technique and materials you prefer.



If you can't draw where it's located.

Your heritage treasure can be done at home, at school, or wherever your teacher or the person who accompanies you indicates.

The size of the drawing can be whatever you want.

Accompany your drawing with some notes and data that allow you to know more about your heritage treasure.

You can also write or record what is cultural heritage for you? and why have you selected that heritage to draw it?

When you finish, write in your drawing your name and surname, the city where you are and your country.

Also think of a name for your drawing.

It's time to meet and share your experience with other people around the world.

Your drawings should be sent by email to the organizers of the pedagogical method project Reconnecting With Your Culture.

To do this, the drawings must be digitized. This is done by scanning them or taking a photograph of them.



What should you email?

The map you drew.

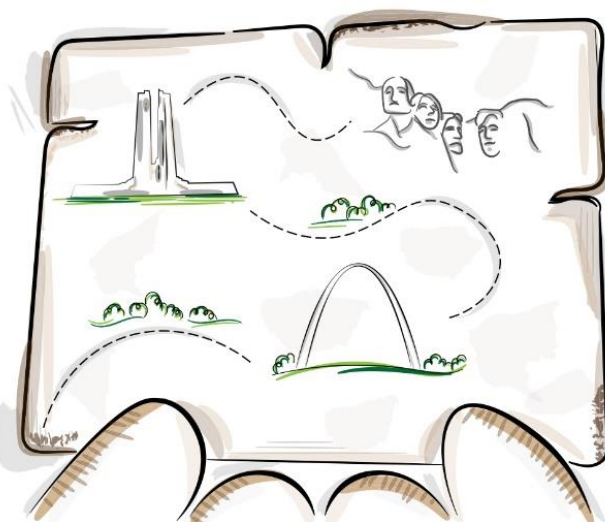
The drawing of your heritage treasure.

You should scan or take some good pictures of your drawings.

If you take a picture of it, make sure they are well lit, & that no shadow is on the drawing.

You must save it on the computer in JPG

Check with your school if they will send your drawing or if you can do it.



Where should the drawings be sent?

Drawings should be sent to the email address of your National Committee country (see the list at the end of the guide).

The Subject of the email can say:

Drawing by RWYC, - School name and country

Example: RWYC – Leonardo da Vinci School, Florence, Italy

The Body or Text of the mail must include:
Title of the drawing.

Name and surname of the participant Age
Country City.

Name of the school or college Email
address of a contact person.

The organizers of the Reconnecting With Your Culture project and your school will plan a meeting so that you can show and explain the heritage treasure you have found and drawn.

Now, the search for your heritage treasure begins.



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
