



It is a space where each of them leaves a bit of themselves, sharing their reflections, perspectives and creating together a definition of heritage from the cultural base of the community.





RWYC Intercontinental Seminar ResiliArt Debate for UNESCO Mondiacult2022


RWYC INDONESIA FEBRUARY 4, 2022

In conjunction with the important event of UNESCO World Conference on Cultural Policies – Mondiacult 2022. We, RWYC Indonesia for and on behalf of RWYC Asia and RWYC International also supported by Chakra Cultural Foundation hold a RESILIART DEBATE with the focus subject is "Awakening Culture Awareness to The Younger Generation." Our seminar is under the theme number 5 of ResiliArt Debate Guidance, which is Professional training and interdisciplinary education for a flourishing, inclusive culture sector. This seminar is a panel discussion intent to focalize the significance of culture for the growth of children and the value in their life, consisting of the four Panelists, those are Prof. Rana P.B. Singh (India), Prof. Aditi Misra (India), D. Paul Schafer (Canada), and Dr. Mira Sartika (Indonesia), and Moderator is Prof. Olimpia Niglio (Italy). The panellists elaborate and discuss four questions in roughly 90 minutes. Each question tailored to each panellist.

The Seminar was indeed a great success with excellent presentations and answers to the four basic questions posed by the RWYC team, Olimpia's skilful abilities as a moderator and founder in moving everything forward so effectively and smoothly, interesting observations and comments from participants in Sri Lanka, Syria, Morocco, Japan, and Gabriel and Brazil towards the end of the Seminar, and the outstanding organization of the Seminar by Mira and her talented colleagues in Indonesia.

Furthermore, we also submitted the conclusion of our seminar to UNESCO, includes three major cultural policy gaps and needs identified as follows:

- 1. The implementation of cultural policy stated in the Mexico City Declaration in 1982, article 35. For us the implementation for culture to become an integral part in education systems is still very low. Therefore, please address the above article as to how the implementation should be for every country in the world.
- 2. The implementation of cultural policy stated in the Mexico City Declaration in 1982, article 15.
- 3. The implementation of cultural policy stated in the Mexico City Declaration in 1982, article 50. As we can see in the reality today, there are still so many cases all over the world that indigenous people are being casted away from their original homeland for the reason of the land development or area development. Thus, education and culture have not yet become essential factors to establish a new international economic order. To date, 40 years later, the realization is still the other way around.

In Tokyo the works were divided to display in three venues due to the limited spaces but at Sapporo all the works were displayed together. It was, let us say, a spectacular to see them. Despite the administrative restrictions as a measure against Covid-19, so many people gathered, and they were watching the works with great joy and interest. We recognized that this exhibition evoked lively interest about, not only the RWYC's activity but also its educational program and method among visitors. The exhibition had, we can say, a great success.

RWYC Japan wishes, in this wonderful cultural interchange experience that art encompasses all the developmental domains and fosters creativity in children. It can assist in developing their imagination and enhancing their decision -making skills. SEMINAR PIZZA/ORIGAMI

RWYC (ITALY-JAPAN) March 28, 2022

The elementary school of Salinagrande and the Afterschool Kugayama Kids have designed a cultural exchange seminar between Italy and Japan which takes place in two acts preceded by the sharing of information regarding some aspects of the respective cultures: geographical and climatic data, historical and religious information, typical festivities and gastronomic traditions.

Once this study was carried out, we scheduled the first meeting which took place on Monday 28 March. On this occasion, the Japanese children proposed three play activities: The first consisted in guessing through a pantomime some typical holidays of their country, one for each month of the year; The second in creating two objects with the origami technique, a heart and a budgie, which the children of Salinagrande performed live following the moves of their Japanese peers. This was the most complex game that allowed us to better understand a technique for which the tradition had been explained to them but which they had never put into practice. Finally they all sang a very famous song together in which you also have to use your hands and feet to participate.

The final moment was the greetings, but no one wanted to leave the meeting. In the following days, enthusiastic about what they learned, the Sicilian children continued to practice on other paper animals under the supervision of their teacher.

In a few weeks will take place the second seminar which includes a program similar to the first but with reversed parts and in which the children of Salinagrande will show their Tokyo friends how to make and cook a typical Trapani pasta, the "busiate col pesto", and how to make the Pizza. Japanese children will repeat at home what they learned during the meeting. Once again the final moment will be a famous piece of our singing tradition to sing together.

DRAWING OUR NATURAL HERITAGE

(RWYC COLOMBIA) May 3, 2022

The drawings made for the exhibition were created as a protest against the decision by the administration of the city of Ibagué-Tolima to cut down a series of ancient trees in the center of the city. Thanks to the action of the citizens and the discontent expressed from artistic and collective expressions, it was possible to avoid the "Parque Centenario" project, which would cut down a percentage of native trees in the region and the park, to pave the area and build concrete scenarios

RWYC NIGERIA POST-PROGRAMME REPORT

The international RWYC Programme was created in July 2020 during the pandemic lockdowns by Professor Olympia Niglio and promoted by the International Research Center EdA Esempi di Architettura (Italia) in collaboration with UNESCO University and Heritage (Spain). The WASCHTrust was invited to partake in the programme in march 2021 to coordinate the programme in West Africa and also to assist with sourcing for partners in other African regions.

As a flagship effort, the local RWYC-WA Team was able to secure institutional support to execute the inaugural edition only in Lagos. These partners are -ShawlArchiTunde.Africa LTD, Van Pebbles Hub, Tasanee NG, Loving Lagos Limited, Mike Adenuga Centre/Alliance Française de Lagos, Taiwo Akinlami Child Protection Academy, Mbari Uno and Seventh Sports & Events Ltd. Individual Donors were Chuka Mordi, Nneamaka Okafor, Nmadili Okwumabua & Peju Ibekwe.

Three institutions were invited and accepted to participate in the series of activities - Vernacular Art Laboratory, Slum Art Foundation & JCI Festac.

The programme presented a timely opportunity for the WASCHTrust to achieve one of its founding objectives; "To promote socio-economic development of youth, through various capacity building activities, and demonstrate the contribution of heritage conservation to their wellbeing". A high level of interest was shown by participating institutions and the feedback received was that there are little or no avenues for underrepresented children to be engaged in international art initiatives, as such RWYC was a laudable programme they are willing to take part in on a regular basis.

The RWYC Team plans to increase effort in the area of fundraising, to garner enough resources to expand the scope achieved in the inaugural edition to accommodate more participants within the coverage area. It is expected that subsequent editions will explore the regionality goals of the host institution by executing satellite programmes in other West African communities and facilitating cultural exchanges between participants.



A MESAGGE FROM A RWYC MEMBER

CINCUENTA AÑOS DE PATRIMONIO MUNDIAL Y RWYC

1972 fue un año prometedor frente al compromiso internacional e intergeneracional en pro de la gestión racional y sostenible del patrimonio cultural y natural.

No sólo se aprobó, en el seno de la Asamblea General de la Organización de las Naciones Unidas (ONU), la Declaración de Estocolmo sobre el Medio Ambiente Humano (https://www.un.org/es/conferences/environment/stockholm1972), contentiva del primer reconocimiento expreso del derecho humano al ambiente a nivel mundial, y propulsora de las ideas de patrimonio natural, desarrollo sostenible y de inescindible interdependencia entre naturaleza y cultura.

En efecto, también se creó el Programa de las Naciones Unidas para el Ambiente (PNUMA) (https://www.unep.org/es/el-pnuma-los-50), como institución universal líder, que define la agenda global ambiental; y, nació, en el marco de la Organización de las Naciones Unidas para la Educación, la Ciencia y la Cultura (UNESCO), el Programa científico intergubernamental "El Hombre y la Biósfera" -"Man & Biosphere" - (https://en.unesco.org/mab), al objeto de apuntalar el enfoque ecosistémico, sostenible y de equidad intergeneracional, fundado sobre esa interdependencia ontológica entre el ser humano y la naturaleza, aplicando las ciencias naturales y sociales a la gestión racional de las hoy 727 reservas de biósfera, en 131 países del mundo.

Pero ese año 1972 fue aún más prolijo, al haberse firmado en París, Francia, el 21 de noviembre de 1972, también en el ámbito de la UNESCO, la trascendental Convención sobre la Protección del Patrimonio Mundial, Cultural y Natural (https://whc.unesco.org/archive/convention-es.pdf), sobre cuyo aniversario de cinco décadas, en conmemoración, presentamos estas breves líneas.

Se trata de un tratado internacional que concreta un eficiente sistema de cooperación para la salvaguarda del patrimonio cultural y natural, considerando, en su preámbulo, que el deterioro o la desaparición de un elemento patrimonial constituye un empobrecimiento nefasto del patrimonio de la humanidad.

Este mecanismo está reservado a bienes patrimoniales materiales que a juicio del Comité de Patrimonio Mundial de la UNESCO y a propuesta del Estado en cuyo territorio se sitúen, revistan un valor universal excepcional, en lo cultural y/o en lo natural, siendo inscritos en la Lista del Patrimonio Mundial, pudiendo aspirar a financiamiento del Fondo del Patrimonio Mundial, para su conservación. Ha sido remarcable la labor de dicho Comité, en cuanto a la gestión de la citada Lista y de la Lista del Patrimonio Mundial en Peligro.

El texto define patrimonio cultural como monumentos, conjuntos o lugares (obras arquitectónicas, esculturales o pictóricas, estructuras arqueológicas, inscripciones, cavernas, construcciones integradas al paisaje, obras humanas o conjuntas con la naturaleza, con valor universal excepcional en lo histórico, artístico, científico, estético, etnológico o antropológico. Y patrimonio natural los monumentos naturales, zonas hábitat de fauna y flora amenazadas y lugares naturales delimitados, con valor universal excepcional en lo científico, estético y de conservación.

La Convención no reconoce explícitamente el derecho humano al patrimonio de la humanidad, pero los intérpretes son contestes acerca de su reconocimiento implícito, al establecer como contrapartida lógica de tal derecho, la obligación de los Estados de identificar, proteger, conservar, revalorizar, rehabilitar, asegurar el acceso a las generaciones presentes y transmitir a las futuras el patrimonio cultural y natural. Y resulta de suyo importantísimo destacar que se estima que de esta Convención, de la Declaración de Estocolmo y de desarrollos posteriores académicos, normativos y jurisprudenciales, deriva indirecta pero efectivamente, y en interdependencia con otros derechos como lo son el derecho al ambiente, el derecho al paisaje, el derecho a la ciudad y el derecho a la cultural o a participar libremente en la actividad cultural, el derecho humano al patrimonio cultural y natural, en general. Es decir, tanto el que revista valor universal y excepcional, como el que sea de carácter nacional, regional o local, e incluso nada excepcional, pero significativo desde la perspectiva de los derechos a la identidad cultural y al respeto de la diversidad cultural, y por tanto no inscrito en la referida Lista, con las mismas obligaciones para los Estados

El derecho humano al patrimonio forma parte del contenido esencial del derecho humano a participar en la vida cultural de la comunidad, previsto en la Declaración Universal de los Derechos Humanos, Ahora bien, el método pedagógico internacional Reconnecting With Your Culture, al incidir en los niños y jóvenes de 5 a 17 años, en diálogo intergeneracional con profesores y familiares, constituye una herramienta de difusión y de ejecución de esta Convención, pues mediando su implementación en las escuelas del mundo, promueve la revalorización del patrimonio cultural y natural, incentivando su identificación y conservación desde las comunidades, en un sentir surgido de ese diálogo, y expresado en un dibujo libre y una reseña propia de la inspiración del niño.

Facilita el goce del derecho al patrimonio cultural, dentro de un ejercicio práctico y creativo que muestra una educación para el patrimonio cultural y natural, y genera diálogo no solo inter sino también intrageneracional, con sus pares de la misma y otras comunidades, gracias a los intercambios y exposiciones internacionales de los dibujos.

Festejamos entonces el 50 aniversario de la Convención de París, que invita al respeto de la diversidad cultural y de la biodiversidad en pro de la paz.

ABSTRACT

A reflection is proposed on the methods of teaching and learning about the city, oriented to the different areas of knowledge of the urban discipline such as history, theory, criticism and technique. The book proposes a methodology that complements the teaching of basic concepts of Urbanism studied in the classroom, which are tested in person through tours of the city as an extension of the academic space.

The methodology is developed with the purpose of providing the student with new instruments of analysis that allow highlighting the elements of the urban context, the historical and contemporary characteristics of the city and the aesthetic potentialities that generate spaces of significance and their effects on the collective welfare consequent to the changing lifestyles of society.

The exercise implies a direct interaction of the student with the place from the observation and graphic representation of the environment through the codification of each of the theoretical concepts such as paths, limits, nodes, neighborhoods and landmarks. Similarly, in order to recognize the territory and its urban history, complementary planimetric and cartographic base material was used to allow the student to recognize the adaptation of the city to the Magdalena River geography in the municipality of Ambalema.

From the drawing it is possible to represent and recognize the relevance that implies the use of the natural elements of the environment and the way in which they have provided guidelines to man for the conformation and growth of human settlements, as well as the aspects that derive from this process and result in becoming the main technical and aesthetic distinctive components of cities where the inhabitants have used the local resources until today in a singular way and result in building the image of the city where society is certainly reflected.

Reconnecting with your culture: Identifying the cultural heritage of children in Santa Bárbara d'Oeste-SP

ABSTRACT

In Brazil, the first instrument of preservation, the tipping, was instituted in 1937, by the same law that created the then National Historical and Artistic Heritage Service (SPHAN). In addition, Decree-Law 25 also defined that

The national historical and artistic heritage is the set of movable and immovable assets existing in the country and whose conservation is of public interest, either because of their link to memorable facts in the history of Brazil, or because of their exceptional archaeological or ethnographic, bibliographic or bibliographic value, artistic

The Federal Constitution of Brazil, enacted in 1988, defines in Article 216 that "Brazilian cultural heritage constitutes goods of a material and immaterial nature, taken individually or together, bearers of reference to the identity, action, memory of different groups. formators of Brazilian society [...]" (BRASIL, 2016, p. 127, emphasis added). In this way, the law opened up to the symbolic meanings that people ascribe to cultural artifacts and practices. As a result, by law, the values attributed locally to artifacts and practices started to be considered and respected along with the intellectual parameters already established (ARANTES, 2009).

However, even today, this is not what is seen in the constitution of the Brazilian heritage stock, where Catholic religious buildings predominate, the result of the half century of predominance of heritage and the criteria of "linking to memorable facts and exceptional value" [1]. As Paulo Marins points out when commenting on the lecture by Sérgio Miceli (1987) at the opening of the commemoration of the 50th anniversary of IPHAN,

The programme was organised under the guidance of Honourable Prof. Rana P.B. Singh along with the principal of the school Dr. Anita Pauline Dey, with a vision to spread awareness about our cultural heritage and also to develop a sense of unity and belonging within the young generation and allow them to understand in a better way about previous generations and the history.

Mallikarjuna Temple in Varanasi is a replica of Mallikarjuna Jyotirlinga situated at Shree Shail Parvat (mountain) that is on the bank of River Krishna in Krishna district of Andhra Pradesh, India which is one of the Dwadasa (12) Jyotirlingas. 'Mallika' means 'Goddess Parvati' and 'Arjuna' means 'Lord Shiva'. It is believed that by worshipping Mallikarjuna Jyotirlinga, referents can get rid of all their sins and all their wishes are fulfilled. Mallikarjuna temple is known to be in existence since ancient time. It is also believed that Lord Shiva appeared as Arjuna on Amavasya (No moon day) and Goddess Parvati as Mallika on Poornima (full moon day), and hence the name Mallikarjuna






